

COUNCIL MINUTES

June 3, 2013

The City Council of the City of Mesa met in a Study Session in the lower level meeting room of the Council Chambers, 57 East 1st Street, on June 3, 2013 at 5:16 p.m.

(Mayor Smith excused Councilwoman Higgins from the beginning of the meeting; she arrived at 5:17 p.m.)

Review items on the agenda for the June 3, 2013 Regular Council meeting.

All of the items on the agenda were reviewed among Council and staff and the following was noted:

Conflict of interest: None

Items removed from the consent agenda: 11(Finter)

Planning Director John Wesley stated that with respect to item 7-d (Z13-23), it was necessary to correct the ordinance to read "Meridian Road" as opposed to Mountain Road. He noted that the corrected verbiage would be read into the record at tonight's Council meeting.

Mr. Wesley further indicated that regarding item 7-e (A13-01), it was also necessary to make revisions to this ordinance as follows: Page 2, the 17.51 acres will be corrected to read 35.79± acres; and Page 3, Paragraph 2 of the ordinance will be deleted in its entirety.

Vice Mayor Finter expressed appreciation to the Office of Management and Budget Director Candace Cannistraro and her staff for their efforts and hard work in developing the tentative proposed FY 2013/14 Budget Plan.

Ms. Cannistraro addressed the Council and reported that the tentative proposed budget (**See Attachment 1**) contains two items that were not included in last year's budget. She explained that those items would increase the tentative budget maximum.

Ms. Cannistraro noted that the first item is the Access to Care Program, which is an assessment that the area hospitals requested that the City impose on them so that the City could draw down federal funds on their behalf. She pointed out that since the City would draw down those dollars, it was necessary that they be reflected in the City's adopted budget for expenditure limitation purposes. She added that \$30 million has been included in the tentative proposed FY 2013/14 budget for that purpose.

Mayor Smith stated that he wanted to make it perfectly clear that even though the \$30 million is included in the tentative budget, the City is simply acting as a conduit in this process and there will be no increased costs to Mesa's residents.

Ms. Cannistraro confirmed Mayor Smith's statement. She clarified that the City is a pass-through mechanism that allows the hospitals to draw down the federal funds that come through the City of Mesa. She reiterated that per State Statute, the City must include those monies in its maximum expenditure limitation.

Mayor Smith commented that another issue that has not been made clear is that one of the conditions that the Council placed on the assessment is that the hospitals would not pass on the cost to their patients.

Ms. Cannistraro confirmed Mayor Smith's statement.

Mayor Smith restated that the City would impose an assessment on the hospitals that would not be passed through to their patients. He said that such a program would enable the hospitals access to federal funds to help those facilities recover certain uncompensated costs.

Ms. Cannistraro further reported that the other item included in the proposed tentative budget is the Highway Project Advancement Notes (HPAN). She explained that each year, the City of Mesa receives funding from the Arizona Department of Transportation (ADOT) for the purpose of repaying the interest on those notes. She stated that in FY 2013/14, the City will accelerate some of the repayment of the principal, which will result in an increase to the budget of approximately \$20 million. She added that once the City receives the funds from ADOT, they will be forwarded on to repay the notes.

Ms. Cannistraro pointed out that since those monies are a reimbursement, they must also be included in the City's expenditure limitation maximum. She stated that both of the items, which total \$50 million, equate to a zero net effect to the citizens of Mesa and also to the City's operating budget.

City Attorney Debbie Spinner remarked that Ms. Cannistraro was prepared to make a recommended change to the ordinance for item 7-h (Modifying rates for water utility services). She stated that if the Council concurs with the recommendation, item 7-h will remain on the consent agenda.

Ms. Cannistraro advised that with respect to item 7-h, it was the recommendation of staff that Schedule WR3.3 be deleted from the ordinance. She stated that WR3.3 does not currently have any customers and noted that the incorrect rate schedule was attached to the ordinance. She indicated that staff will make the necessary corrections to the schedule. She added that when the agenda item is read into the record at the Council meeting, it would reflect "As revised in the Study Session," which would allow the ordinance to be introduced in a manner that would be approved at the June 17, 2013 Council meeting.
