- IV. **Public Hearing #2 – City of Mesa FY 2011/2012 Annual Action Plan.** This public hearing is the second in a series of two regarding the City's FY 2011/2012 Annual Action Plan. The hearing is required per the City's Citizen Participation Plan, and the following items must be discussed:
 - A. Resources anticipated to be made available within the City on a fiscal year basis: As an entitlement community, the City of Mesa anticipates receiving the following allocations for FY 2011/2012:
 - \$3,723,107 CDBG
 - \$1,486,510 HOME
 - \$150,543 ESGIn the event that the City receives an allocation that differs from the anticipated allocations, the City will seek direction from the City Council on the most appropriate method to distribute those funds to the programs identified for funding in the Plan. These methods may include pro-rata adjustments to all projects

identified for funding or a new prioritization of the projects for the purpose of making final awards under the affected programs.

- B. Eligible range of activities that may be undertaken concerning such federal programs:** The City's proposed FY 2011/2012 Annual Action Plan (Plan) contains the City's short-term goals and strategies, including specific activities recommended for funding under the FY 2011/2012 Community Development Block Grant (CDBG), HOME Investment Partnerships (HOME), and Emergency Shelter Grant (ESG) programs. The activities described are those that the City of Mesa plans to undertake to address priority needs, in terms of local objectives, that were identified in the City's 2010-2014 Consolidated Plan. These activities and projects are as follows:

- C. Amount of CDBG, HOME, and ESG resources anticipated to benefit income qualified persons: The City of Mesa anticipates utilizing at least 70% of the CDBG, HOME, and ESG resources in FY 2011/2012 for the benefit of low- and moderate income persons.
- D. Plans by the City to minimize displacement of persons from the intended uses of CDBG, HOME, and ESG resources invested: Due to the type of projects selected, the City of Mesa does not anticipate displacing any persons as a direct result of the utilization of FY 2011/2012 CDBG, HOME, and ESG funds.
- E. Public comments: At this time, the general public is encouraged to provide any comments they may have regarding the FY 2011/2012 Annual Action Plan. Please complete a blue card in the back of the room and submit it to staff if you wish to speak. Each speaker will have approximately three minutes and must state their name, institutional affiliation (if applicable), and city of residence.

Written comments regarding the FY 2011/2012 Annual Action Plan may also be submitted during the 30-Day Public Comment Period that began on Wednesday, March 30th, 2011 and concludes at the end of business on Thursday, April 28th, 2011. All comments received by the City will be included in the final version of the Plan submitted to the Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD).

- F. Approval and submission of Plan: Approval of the proposed FY 2011/2012 Annual Action Plan is tentatively scheduled on May 2nd, 2011 at the regularly scheduled City Council meeting at 5:45 p.m. in the Upper Level Council Chambers (57 E. First Street, Mesa, AZ 85201). The submission deadline to HUD is May 16th, 2011.
