September 14, 2011

The Public Safety Committee of the City of Mesa met in the lower level meeting room of the Council Chambers, 57 East 1st Street, on September 14, 2011 at 7:34 a.m.

(Items on the agenda were discussed out of order, but for purposes of clarity will remain as listed on the agenda.)

1. Items from citizens present.

There were no items from citizens present.

2-a. Hear a presentation and discuss Emergency Management.

Fire Chief Harry Beck addressed the Committee and reported that during the recent power outage the Emergency Management System that supports the community was challenged and the new Emergency Operations Center (EOC) was activated. Chief Beck commented on the reorganization and restructuring efforts made by staff and said that due to budget reductions there had been concerns regarding the ability to continue some of the EOC efforts and programs.

Chief Beck introduced Battalion Chief Cori Darnell who displayed a PowerPoint presentation **(See Attachment 2)** outlining the EOC remodel and the significant improvements made to the command center.

Chairman Kavanaugh remarked that the old EOC resembled a relic from the Cold War days. He stated that the new EOC is more functional and similar to others around the country. He described the remodel as an “extreme makeover” that was completed on a “shoestring” budget.

Chief Darnell reported that National Incident Management System (NIMS) and Incident Command System (ICS) guidelines were followed in the reconfiguration of the EOC. She advised that technology was updated in order to provide the City Manager's office and the City Council the ability to remain informed of any incidents that may occur. She reported that some of the technology updates that the EOC received included videoconferencing, teleconferencing and Wi-Fi connectivity. (See Page 3 of Attachment 2)

In response to a question from Chairman Kavanaugh, Chief Darnell explained that the Department is researching the possibility of having one cell phone provider. She said that there are several different cell phone providers in the area and some do not work well inside the EOC. Chief Darnell stated updates have been made to the infrastructure to improve cell phone service inside the EOC.

Chief Darnell advised that additional conference space and a break room will be available in the future.

Responding to a question from Chairman Kavanaugh, Chief Darnell explained that in the event the EOC is damaged in some way back-up generators are available. She said that the Mobile Command vehicle has the ability to function as a "mini" EOC and police and fire substations with multiple computers can also function in an EOC capacity.

Chief Darnell reported that the EOC will use the same internet-based software used by the State of Arizona, Maricopa County and many other cities in the Valley. She said the software has many benefits, is very user friendly and has the capability to view incidents occurring in other jurisdictions. In addition, she said that the City Manager's office will also have the ability to view the EOC status log and remain current on events. (See Page 4 of Attachment 2)

Chief Darnell briefly highlighted some of the functions of the new Web-based EOC software (See Page 5 of Attachment 2) which includes:

- documentation of events
- plans of action
- status logs
- resource allocation
- costs

In response to a question from Chairman Kavanaugh, Chief Darnell explained that the City Manager and the City Council will be provided access to the EOC Website and will be notified of any incidents that occur in the City.

Chief Darnell stated that the previous system was not robust enough to handle the needs of an EOC. She explained that the new system will be a daily benefit not only for Emergency Management but also for the Police Department, Water Resources Department, Utility Department and Transportation Department. She said the system will allow nearly 3,000 users to be added to the system and has the ability to send notifications to seven different devices a person may have including; multiple email addresses, phone numbers, text messages and voicemail. She added that the system has a broad spectrum and is used worldwide by Fortune 500 companies on a daily basis. (See Page 6 of Attachment 2)

Chief Darnell explained that Emergency Management is not a police and fire function but a city function that can impact multiple departments within the City. She said that depending on the situation city departments sometimes continue to mitigate emergency situations long after the initial incident.

Chief Darnell briefly highlighted the Community Emergency Response Team (CERT) program which is a popular grant-funded program that provides emergency preparedness training for citizens. She added that currently there is not an active CERT team and that the support of faith-based groups has been solicited. (See Page 8 of Attachment 2)

Chief Darnell advised that having a Citizen Corps Council in place is required for grant funding. She said that Councilmember Finter currently serves on the Citizen Corps Council and has provided direction on how to engage private sector participation. (See Page 9 of Attachment 2)

Chairman Kavanaugh stressed the importance of Emergency Management and expressed his appreciation for the teamwork among the various City departments.

Chairman Kavanaugh thanked staff for the presentation.

2-b. Hear a presentation and discuss the Citizen Online Incident Reporting System for the Police Department.

Assistant Chief of Police John Meza addressed the Committee and said that the Citizen Online Reporting system was approved by Council in August of 2010. He introduced Police Commander Joe Shelley who displayed a PowerPoint presentation (**See Attachment 3**) demonstrating how to use the Citizens Online Police Reporting system.

Commander Shelley advised that the Citizen Online Police Reporting system was implemented on September 1, 2011 and has the ability to report five different types of crimes online. He introduced Information Technology Architect Steve Toth and noted that there are other issues involving the National Crime Information Center (NCIC) that will need to be worked out in order to minimize officer workloads. He explained that citizens can use a computer, iPad, iPhone, android, or blackberry to report certain crimes online. He stated that if an individual should encounter a problem during the online reporting they may call for assistance using the phone number provided.

Commander Shelley demonstrated how to report a crime online and said that customer service was a major consideration in the design of the program. He explained that a detailed report takes approximately 15 minutes to complete online and a non-detailed report takes about 5 minutes to complete. He pointed out that before a user can access the system they must agree that they understand that making a false police report is against the law. (See Page 6 of Attachment 3)

Commander Shelley continued with the online crime reporting demonstration and explained that depending on the responses provided to certain questions users could be directed to call the non-emergency number 480-644-2211 or 9-1-1. He advised that questions with a red asterisk are mandatory fields that must be answered before continuing with the report. He explained that 2,000 characters can be used to describe the incident and this information will be provided to officers in their patrol cars. Commander Shelley stated that the system will assign a temporary

report number and the user will be able to print out a copy of the report for their records instead of having to go to the police station and pay \$5.00 for a copy of the report.

In response to a question from Committeemember Richins, Commander Shelley explained that a vehicle burglary cannot be reported online as it is a situation where the police need to obtain evidence from the scene. He said a theft could be reported online if there were no witnesses or evidence that could be obtained. He noted that an intrusion on personal property, such a vehicle burglary, is more serious than a theft.

Chief Meza advised that online reporting will initially focus on crimes involving hit-and-runs, shoplifting, identity thefts, thefts and lost property.

Responding to a question from Chairman Kavanaugh, Commander Shelly explained that online reporting will be a useful tool for shift briefings. He said that the reports will be integrated into the CrimeReports system and will assist in the tracking of crime trends.

Commander Shelley stated that it is anticipated that 4,000 online crime reports will be received this year and that number could increase when more types of crimes can be reported online. He noted that citizens will also have the ability to do a supplemental report after a report has been submitted.

Chairman Kavanaugh expressed his appreciation for the efforts made by staff and said that the Committee would be interested in hearing a progress report in relation to the number of reports filed and the number of people using the system in each district. He said if necessary, Councilmembers could assist in educating the public on the use of the online reporting system.

Responding to a question from Committeemember Glover, Commander Shelley explained that if an individual calls the non-emergency line to report a crime the dispatcher will ask certain questions to determine if the crime meets the criteria for online reporting. He stated that if the call does meet the criteria and the caller has internet capabilities, the call will be forwarded to an automated answering system that will direct the individual to the Citizen Online Reporting System. He advised that an individual meeting the online reporting criteria could still have the option to have an officer dispatched to their location. He added that Chief Meza has mandated that staff ensure that customer service has not been overlooked.

In response to a question from Committeemember Richins, Commander Shelley advised that information regarding online reporting has been provided to Crime Prevention Officers and posted on Facebook, Twitter and Channel 11. In addition, he said that the information will also be available on the City's Website. He reported that in the first 10 days the system was in operation 65 online reports were received.

Chief Meza concurred with Chairman Kavanaugh and said that a four month review would be beneficial to determine how well the system is working and identify areas that may need to be adjusted.

Responding to a question from Committeemember Richins, Commander Shelley explained that Mesa is the first city in the Valley to launch an online crime reporting system. He said there are other cities that are using the program but not to the same extent as Mesa.

Chief Meza advised that the information received from crimes reported online is distributed to detectives and analyzed.

Mr. Toth advised that the Police Department will have the ability to view incidents that have occurred in other jurisdictions once those jurisdictions implement online reporting.

2-c. Hear a presentation and discuss the Photo Safety Contract.

Commander Bill Peters displayed a PowerPoint presentation (**See Attachment 1**) highlighting the current configuration of the Photo Safety Program, program recommendations and the future of the Photo Safety Program. He explained that the purpose of the Photo Safety Program is to enhance traffic safety by supplementing traditional traffic enforcement methods that improve driver behavior. (See Pages 2 & 3 of Attachment 1)

Commander Peters provided a brief history of the Photo Safety Program and said that the current Photo Safety contract has been in place since 2006. He advised that since the beginning of the contract two amendments have been made and some cameras were relocated from fixed locations to school zones.

Commander Peters reported that currently the Photo Safety Program consists of five speed camera vans, four of which are in operation at all times. He advised that 30 of the City-owned cameras are intersection cameras and four are school zone cameras located at Brimhall and Fremont Junior High School. In addition, he said that two additional cameras belonging to American Traffic Solutions (ATS) were installed at Rhodes Junior High School. (See Page 5 of Attachment 1)

Commander Peters reported that in 2005, before cameras were installed in intersections, 694 crashes occurred. He said after the installation of cameras the number of crashes reported in 2010 was 370. He explained that an injury accident requires 5.13 hours of investigation time by an officer and a non-injury accident requires 3.44 hours of investigation and report writing time. Commander Peters estimated the cost savings in the form of wages as a result of the reductions in crashes to be \$41,794 and a savings of 1,228 in patrol hours. He noted that intersection cameras have reduced the number of crashes in intersections and allowed officers to remain on patrol. (See Page 6 of Attachment 1)

Responding to a question from Committeemember Richins, Commander Peters explained that redesigning intersections, along with changes in traffic patterns, have contributed to the reduction of crashes. He said that photo safety cameras were originally installed in high traffic areas and that some of these intersections no longer have the same volume of traffic.

Committeemember Richins commented that the cameras, along with the reconfiguration of the intersections, have reduced the number of accidents at intersections.

Commander Peters briefly reviewed the effectiveness of the Photo Safety Program in the school zones. He said that in the year 2008 the first school zone camera was installed at Rhodes Junior High and subsequent cameras were installed at Brimhall Junior High and Fremont Junior High. He explained how the average miles per hour (mph) traveled in the school zones has decreased since the installation of cameras in those areas. He reported that during non-school hours near Rhodes Junior High School, when the speed limit is 45 mph, the average speed

dropped from 48.2 mph to 42.6 mph after cameras were installed. He noted that there were similar reductions after cameras were installed at Brimhall and Fremont Junior High Schools. (See Page 7 of Attachment 1)

Commander Peters reported that out of the 22,342 citations that were issued 3,797 were mailed to Mesa addresses and 18,545 were mailed outside of Mesa. (See Page 8 of Attachment 1)

In response to a question from Committeemember Richins, Commander Peters explained that of the 3,797 citations mailed to Mesa addresses 539 were from the photo radar vans.

Commander Peters displayed a snapshot of the number of photo red light and photo speed enforcement citations for the FY 2010-11. (See Page 9 of Attachment 1) He explained that the Red Light Photo Safety Program is losing an estimated \$39.53 per adjudicated citation and that each Photo Speed Enforcement citation generates approximately \$65.05 in revenue for the City.

Commander Peters advised that 62% of the Photo Speed Enforcement citations occurred at the fixed school zone locations.

Responding to a question from Committeemember Richins, Commander Peters explained that the total number of program citations reflected on Page 8 of Attachment 1 are based on the 2011 calendar year through the month of May and not on a fiscal year cycle.

Commander Peters advised that the loan for the equipment leased through ATS has been paid in full. He explained that the equipment has two years of useful service left and the program could be extended for two more years to allow the City to maximize the full usefulness of the equipment. He stated that the extension would provide the Police Department an opportunity to fully evaluate and study the overall process and determine the future direction of the Photo Safety Program. In addition, he said that some of the red light cameras could be relocated to school zones.

Chairman Kavanaugh commented that the photo safety equipment is paid for, therefore, the Police Department is requesting that the contract be extended in order to take advantage of the remaining useful life of the equipment. In addition, he said the Police Department will refocus attention to some of the school zones and areas in the community where residents have reported speeding issues.

Commander Peters advised that the Police Department intends to reallocate cameras to more dangerous areas and reduce the number of mobile cameras. He said as a result of the decline in the economy the department does not have enough motor officers, therefore, having cameras to collect data and change drivers' behavior is a benefit.

Chairman Kavanaugh stated that the recommendation from the Police Department is to work towards extending the Photo Safety contract by two years and redeploy photo safety equipment to school zones and neighborhoods.

Committeemember Richins expressed his support for extending the Photo Safety contract two years so long as the focus remained on safety and not on generating revenue. He said that the responsibility of the Police Department is not to make money but to make things safe. He also supported moving the cameras to school zones and neighborhoods where mobile speed cameras could be a benefit. He requested that in the future the Police Department work with the Transportation Department in an effort to improve streets and provide a more “holistic” approach to creating safer streets. He suggested that passive speed cues be added to the Photo Safety Program and that speed traps be eliminated.

Chairman Kavanaugh commented that residents appreciate the use of passive measures that alert drivers of their speed. He noted that Chandler has many places where the driver’s speed is displayed on the side of the road. He stated that he is hopeful that over the next two years funds could be allocated or revenues from the Photo Safety Program could be used to add passive devices to the program. He said that the difference in the number of citations issued to Mesa residents, as opposed to non-Mesa residents, could be a result of safety education or that residents are just aware of where the cameras are located. He added that the focus of the Photo Safety Program should be on increasing safety.

Committeemember Glover expressed his appreciation and support for moving the Photo Safety vans into school zones as well as a two year extension of the Photo Safety Program.

Chairman Kavanaugh stated that the Committee concurred with the Police Department’s recommendation that a two year extension of the Photo Safety contract be negotiated and executed, in addition to potential configuration changes. He said that this item will be forwarded on to the Council for discussion and consideration.

Chairman Kavanaugh thanked staff for their efforts.

3. Adjournment.

Without objection, the Public Safety Committee meeting adjourned at 8:47 a.m.


