Governor's Educator Retention Task Force *Update*

In February 2023, Governor Hobbs announced an executive order to establish an Education Retention Task Force in an effort to rebuild and reinvest in our public schools.

The task force will make recommendations regarding the education retention crisis in a report due in December 2023. By holding ongoing stakeholder meetings and conducting surveys the group hopes to better understand the wide variety of issues affecting retention including pay and benefits, working conditions and teacher preparation programs.




State-wide Educator Retention Survey

- Live July 11, 2023
- Remain open until August 31, 2023
- ► As of 8/15 over 7000 educators have completed the survey
 - Every AZ county is represented (1/2 from Maricopa County)
 - 9 focus groups have been held (50 teachers)
 - ▶ 13 former educator interviews
- ► Goal: 10,000 educators
- Needs:
- <u>Current Educators</u>: Biggest need is in Greenlee, La Paz, Santa Cruz, Graham and Gila counties
- Former educators Need all counties except Maricopa
- <u>Classified Staff and ESPs</u> Missing any responses from Santa Cruz county; low responses from all counties outside Maricopa

Teacher Vacancy Results in Arizona

















Participation by Student Demographics, 2017-20 (Percent Growth)







Dual Enrollment in Arizona High Schools


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Dual Enrollment and Postsecondary Success

In What Ways Does Dual Enrollment Success Influence College-Going for High School Graduates?

- Dual enrollment students were more likely to go to college than their nondual enrollment peers.
- This increased likelihood was greatest for students who are male, Hispanic/Latino, low-income, and special education students who have an IEP.


Dual Enrollment Students' Likelihood of Attending College (Compared to Non-Dual Enrollment)



In What Ways Does Dual Enrollment Success Influence College Persistence for High School Graduates?

- The analysis found that the greatest effects were for male, Hispanic/Latino, non-low-income, and non-IEP dual enrollment students.
- Overall, the effects on persistence were not as strong as those for college enrollment.

Dual Enrollment Students' Likelihood of Persisting in College (Compared to Non-Dual Enrollment)





- ► Budget includes \$15.5 million in support of dual enrollment; policy implementation language included in SB 1729. Effective Date Oct. 29th.
- > \$15 million is dedicated to help defray the cost to students.
 - ▶ Priority given to low-income students.
 - \triangleright Students in Grades 9 and 10 \$300/per year (6 credit hours).
 - ▶ Students in Grades 11 and 12 \$600/per year (12 credit hours).
 - Must have a GPA of 2.5 or higher; earn a passing grade of A, B, or C.
 - Must fulfill a lower division general education credit or is a CTE course that results in a certificate, credential, or license.

- State Board of Education plans to adopt the ADE recommendation at the September Board Meeting
- > \$500,000 is dedicated to honor teachers who skill up by earning their dual enrollment certification.
 - ▶ One-time \$1,000 incentive bonus.
 - Must be a new teacher earning dual enrollment certification and provide instruction in at least one course.

AZ Mayors Education Roundtable

- ► The Arizona Mayors Education Roundtable is a unique nonpartisan collaborative action group, established in 2012 and committed to achieving the statewide post-secondary attainment goal of 60 percent by 2030.
- Roundtable efforts focus on three key areas:
 - 1. Elevating the Mayoral Role in Education
 - 2. Championing Local Initiatives
 - 3. Producing Research and Reports

FAFSA Research, Discussion and Resolution

- ► There appears to be universal support for promoting FAFSA completion and assisting students with the form, but concerns about making it a graduation requirement.
 - ► FAFSA completion is listed as one of several metrics that schools may include in the College and Career Ready Indicator, worth 20% of a grade 9-12 school's A-F letter grade in the state accountability system.
 - Stronger action is needed if Arizona is to significantly increase postsecondary enrollment and attainment.
- ▶ 12 states have now adopted universal FAFSA policy: Connecticut, Indiana, Nebraska, Oklahoma, *California*, Texas, *Colorado*, Illinois, Alabama, Missouri, New Hampshire, Louisiana, Kansas, *Maryland*

Opportunities:

- Arizona ranks 49th in the nation for overall FAFSA completion, however, the state also ranks 15th for most improved. Adding a mandate might dramatically improve the state's national ranking.
- Promise Programs require applicants to submit a complete FAFSA.
- ADE is planning to provide district-level PD for site and district staff on the "Power of FAFSA." A fall pilot program with Agua Fria, Tolleson, and Tempe districts to provide tangible resources to help improve FAFSA completion rates.
- The Arizona FAFSA Coalition offers statewide professional learning opportunities, technical assistance for districts, and virtual/phone FAFSA assistance for students and families. Uptake of these resources along with state funding could increase buy-in and reduce burden on the field.

Obstacles:

- Buy-in and onboarding of counselors statewide. Ensuring that counselors understand the importance of FAFSA is essential to successful implementation.
- Time to collaborate with school and district leaders. Design of opt-out process.
- Submission versus completion. The state's College and Career Ready Indicator only requires students to submit a FAFSA.
- Another unfunded mandate. Arizona has the highest student to counselor ratio in the nation. While a mandate may raise awareness and increase the pressure on schools to help students with the FAFSA, it will stress already overextended counselors.



Resolution Regarding the Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA) 8 August 2023

The Arizona Mayors Education Roundtable is a unique, nonpartisan, collaborative action group committed to achieving the statewide postsecondary attainment goal of 60 percent by 2030. According to the National College Attainment Network, one of the best predictors of postsecondary enrollment is completion of the *Free Application for Federal Student Aid* (FAFSA). High school seniors completing the FAFSA are 84% more likely to enroll immediately in postsecondary education, and low-income FAFSA completers are 127% more likely to enroll immediately. Submitting the FAFSA — often the first step in the financial aid process — provides students with opportunities to access federal and often state and/or institutional resources to pay for college and career training programs. Arizona ranks 49th in the nation for the percentage of high school seniors completing the FAFSA. As of July 21, 40.7% of twelfth grade students have completed a FAFSA.

More than two dozen states have adopted or introduced universal FAFSA completion policies that expand access to financial aid and help make college more affordable for students. These policies tend to provide support and options for students; include waivers, opt-out, and no-harm provisions; and obligate local education agencies to oversee implementation. Twelve states — Louisiana (effective for the class of 2018); Illinois (2021); Alabama and Texas (2022); California and Maryland (2023); Connecticut and New Hampshire (2024); Indiana, Nebraska, and Oklahoma (2025); and Kansas (2028) — have adopted FAFSA completion, or a suitable alternative, as a requirement for high school graduation.

The year after the state mandated financial aid planning for high school graduation, Louisiana's FAFSA completion rate increased 26%. iv High school graduation and postsecondary enrollment rates have also increased, and the state ranks first in the nation for FAFSA completions. v

Given the evidence and growing trend to require FAFSA completion for high school seniors, the Arizona Mayors Education Roundtable resolves to:

- Raise awareness about the significance of FAFSA completion and discuss FAFSA data with councils and local education leaders;
- b. Promote the Arizona Promise Program, local promise initiatives, and statewide FAFSA completion resources (e.g., Ask Benji Chatbot, FAFSA Campaign, FAFSA Challenge, FAFSA Dashboard, and FAFSA Hotline);
- c. Establish FAFSA completion as an expectation for twelfth grade students, and support FAFSA completion events and workshops in their communities; and
- d. Explore approaches for incentivizing FAFSA completion and the potential of making FAFSA completion a high school graduation requirement in accordance with recommendations from the National College Attainment Network.

How do we make gains across Arizona?

Early Childhood

- Offer state-supported full-day Kindergarten and inclusive pre-K
- Recruit and retain a highly-qualified early childhood workforce
- Strengthen free and reduced lunch and after school programs
- Increase educator pay and retain great teachers

High School

- Increase and sustain professional development and coaching for educators
- Create a math equivalent to Read On Arizona

Investing in College Access and Attainment

Areas where the state and municipalities can consider investing include:

- Enhancing college readiness and strengthening the linkages between the K-12 and postsecondary education systems.
- 2 Reducing non-academic barriers to college-going and college completion.
- 3 Making college more affordable for all students.
- Programs and initiatives, including public-private partnerships, that incentivize more students to pursue college degrees in high-value sectors.

Proclamation DRAFT verbiage:

WHEREAS, Obtaining a postsecondary degree is linked to increased employment opportunities, higher income, better health, increased community involvement and contributes to a prospering local economy,

WHEREAS, The Mesa Education and Workforce Development Roundtable serves as a centralizing body reporting to City Council to streamline and coordinate efforts to advance Mesa's education and workforce development goals, including achieving higher educational attainment, including increased attainment of professional certifications and licenses and post-secondary degrees.

WHEREAS, One of the best predictors of postsecondary enrollment and persistence is the completion of the Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA). The first step in providing students with opportunities to access federal and possibly state and/or institutional resources to pay for college and career training programs;

WHEREAS, Arizona currently ranks 49th in FAFSA completion. Nationally, the high school class of 2022 left an estimated \$3.58 billion on the table in the form of unclaimed Pell Grant funds.

WHEREAS, More than a dozen states have either adopted or are considering universal FAFSA policies that expand access to financial aid and help make college more affordable for students. These policies aim to provide support and options for students; include waivers, opt-out and no-harm provisions; and obligate local education agencies to oversee implementation;

WHEREAS, Students who complete the FAFSA are more likely to attend and afford college.

WHEREAS, The City of Mesa is committed to supporting FAFSA awareness and completion in partnership with our local school districts to improve economic mobility and better health outcomes by promoting the Mesa College Promise Program, Arizona Promise Program, and statewide FAFSA completion resources, including, Ask Benji Chatbot, FAFSA Campaign, FAFSA Challenge, FAFSA Dashboard, and FAFSA Hotline.
