1. Call meeting to order, welcome announcements and reminders from the Chair.

Chairperson Spilsbury called the meeting to order. She welcomed Kelsey Rowe and Dr. Dennis Mitchell as designees, and Sherry Richards with Higley Unified School District.

Take action to approve the Roundtable Meeting Minutes from June 7, 2023.

It was moved by Boardmember Jackson Robinson, seconded by Boardmember Nickel, that the June 7, 2023, Education and Workforce Development Roundtable meeting minutes be approved.

 Review scheduling of upcoming meetings and take action to approve proposed 2024 meeting dates.

Chairperson Spilsbury announced the schedule of future meetings would be December 6, 2023; and March 6, June 5, September 4, and December 4, 2024. All meetings would be held at The Studios @ Mesa City Center.

 Update from City, Governor's Office, and Mesa Public Schools Staff on Governor's Educator Retention Task Force.

Education and Workforce Administrator Sarah Tolar displayed a PowerPoint presentation and introduced Selianna Chang, Education Policy Advisor to Governor Katie Hobbs; and Justin Wing, Mesa Public Schools Assistant Superintendent of Human Resources. (See Attachment 1)

Ms. Tolar stated that she and Mr. Wing are representing the East Valley on this Task Force and highlighted their break-out working groups. (See Page 4 of Attachment 1)

Ms. Chang explained that the Task Force has been working on a state-wide educator retention survey which went live on July 11, 2023. She reported that 9,906 surveys have been received to date and the results are being compiled, which will help the Governor's Educator Retention Task Force make recommendations to the Governor by October. (See Page 5 of Attachment 1)

Mr. Wina provided overview of the annual Arizona School Personnel an Administrators Association (ASPAA) survey data reflecting the results of teacher vacancies in Arizona. He reported there is a downturn of teachers going into education and an upturn of teachers leaving education, followed by an uptick in alternative pathways. He discussed the Institutional Recommendation (IR) to obtain certificates and the program types offered to students interested in joining the field, as well as the content being taught. He explained the Mesa Public Schools (MPS) Path 2 Teach program which includes Arizona approved certification programs. He outlined teacher attrition in Arizona, noting the turnover is especially seen in beginning teachers. He shared the Arizona K-12 Center Comprehensive Induction programs that have assisted with teacher retention. He emphasized that Mesa is working to ensure teachers feel supported. 5. Update from City Staff on Read On Mesa Initiative and Job Connect Mesa Platform development and implementation process. Discussion and questions about progress.

Ms. Tolar provided the status of the project and updates for Read On Mesa. (See Page 12 of Attachment 1)

Economic Development Project Manager Bryan Smith reported on the recent job posting data from the last meeting of the Higher Education/Economic Development Convening group and highlighted the current job openings in Arizona. He gave an update on the Job Connect Mesa project and reviewed the stages and timeline for the project. (See Pages 13 through 17 of

6. Presentation by Arizona Governor's Office and Helios Education Foundation Staff on Senate Bill 1729 and increasing access to Dual Enrollment classes.

Chairperson Spilsbury stated the Dual Enrollment program provides high school students the opportunity to earn college credits while attending high school.

Ms. Chang outlined the Dual Enrollment program in Arizona high schools. She referenced the data discussed was provided by Helios Education Foundation and the full report is available online or can be obtained through Sarah Tolar. She emphasized the importance of the program to the Governor, outlining that \$15.5 million has been added to the executive budget to cover the fees and costs for low-income students to participate in the program. She illustrated the pre-pandemic participation numbers and student demographics by gender, income status, race/ethnicity, and school geographic area. (See Pages 19 through 23 of Attachment 1)

Ms. Chang discussed the postsecondary success of the program, comparing the likelihood of Dual Enrollment students attending college versus non-Dual Enrollment students. (See Pages 25 through 28 of Attachment 1)

Ms. Chang reviewed Senate Bill 1729 which indicates where the funding will be allocated and its method of distribution. She highlighted the benefits of the Bill. (See Pages 29 through 31 of Attachment 1)

7. Update from City Staff on AZ Mayors Education Roundtable FAFSA Discussion and Resolution.

Ms. Tolar provided an update on the Arizona Mayors Education Roundtable meeting, stating their focus is how best to impact education. She said their goal is to remove the barriers affecting completion of the Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA). She noted that FAFSA applications are directly tied to higher education enrollment. (See Page 33 and 34 of Attachment 1)

Ms. Tolar reported that currently, 12 states have adopted FAFSA policies. She announced that Arizona ranks 49<sup>th</sup> in the nation overall for FAFSA completion but is 15<sup>th</sup> for most improved. She pointed out that adding a FAFSA completion mandate might dramatically improve the state's national ranking. She discussed the opportunities and obstacles implementing the mandate. She said that mayors in the group drafted a resolution in support of FAFSA completion that can be supported as a state. She mentioned a number of cities have drafted their own resolutions in support of FAFSA completion. (See Pages 35 and 36 of Attachment 1)

8. Continue discussion and provide feedback on June's *Billions to Gain* presentation. Discuss opportunities for Roundtable engagement and action steps to collectively impact educational attainment and workforce development.

Ms. Tolar explained that the Everything to Gain campaign includes a wide range of partners and is a great place to get information and share messages. She reviewed the statistics for where Arizona stands today in learning, noting ways to make gains in early childhood, high school, and after high school. She outlined areas where the State and municipalities can consider investing in college access and attainment. (See Pages 37 through 40 of Attachment 1)

### 9. Discuss and take action on Roundtable's support of City of Mesa FAFSA Proclamation development.

The Roundtable discussed preparing a City of Mesa FAFSA Proclamation that could be presented by the City of Mesa and recommended by the Education and Workforce Development Roundtable.

Ms. Tolar provided possible draft verbiage to use in the resolution.

It was moved by Boardmember Williams, seconded by Boardmember Copple, to move forward with the City of Mesa FAFSA Proclamation development.

David Williams explained the Meta action grant program.

Ms. Tolar said that Northern Arizona University is breaking ground on a Workforce Development Center in East Mesa in November, focused on hospitality, with a goal to have students in chairs next fall. She said the plan is to partner with high schools to offer certifications to students that can be achieved in four full years.

Ms. Tolar reminded the group that the Workforce Center offers resume workshops every Tuesday and the Second Chance Friendly Hiring event is scheduled for September 26, 2023, at the Mesa Convention Center.










# Dual Enrollment Participation Among All AZ Public High School Graduates, 2017-20

# Participation by Student Demographics, 2017-20 (Percent Growth)





- Arizona ranks 49th in the nation for overall FAFSA completion, however, the state also ranks 15th for most improved. Adding a mandate might dramatically improve the state's national ranking.
- Promise Programs require applicants to submit a complete FAFSA.
- ADE is planning to provide district-level PD for site and district staff on the "Power of FAFSA." A fall pilot program with Agua Fria, Tolleson, and Tempe districts to provide tangible resources to help improve FAFSA completion rates.
- The Arizona FAFSA Coalition offers statewide professional learning opportunities, technical assistance for districts, and virtual/phone FAFSA assistance for students and families. Uptake of these resources along with state funding could increase buy-in and reduce burden on the field.

#### Obstacles:

- Buy-in and onboarding of counselors statewide. Ensuring that counselors understand the importance of FAFSA is essential to successful implementation.
- Time to collaborate with school and district leaders. Design of opt-out process.
- Submission versus completion. The state's College and Career Ready Indicator only requires students to submit a FAFSA.
- Another unfunded mandate. Arizona has the highest student to counselor ratio in the nation. While a mandate may raise awareness and increase the pressure on schools to help students with the FAFSA, it will stress already overextended counselors.

## Resolution Regarding the Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA) 8 August 2023

The Arizona Mayors Education Roundtable is a unique, nonpartisan, collaborative action group committed to achieving the statewide postsecondary attainment goal of 60 percent by 2030. According to the National College Attainment Network, one of the best predictors of postsecondary enrollment is completion of the *Free Application for Federal Student Aid* (FAFSA). High school seniors completing the FAFSA are 84% more likely to enroll immediately in postsecondary education, and low-income FAFSA completers are 127% more likely to enroll immediately. Submitting the FAFSA—often the first step in the financial aid process—provides students with opportunities to access federal and often state and/or institutional resources to pay for college and career training programs. Arizona ranks 49th in the nation for the percentage of high school seniors completed a FAFSA. As of July 21, 40.7% of twelfth grade students have completed a FAFSA.

More than two dozen states have adopted or introduced universal FAFSA completion policies that expand access to financial aid and help make college more affordable for students. These policies tend to provide support and options for students; include waivers, opt-out, and no-harm provisions; and obligate local education agencies to oversee implementation.<sup>iii</sup> Twelve states — Louisiana (effective for the class of 2018); Illinois (2021); Alabama and Texas (2022); California and Maryland (2023); Connecticut and New Hampshire (2024); Indiana, Nebraska, and Oklahoma (2025); and Kansas (2028) — have adopted FAFSA completion, or a suitable alternative, as a requirement for high school graduation.

The year after the state mandated financial aid planning for high school graduation Louisiana's FAFSA completion rate increased 26%. High school graduation and postsecondary enrollment rates have also increased, and the state ranks first in the nation for FAFSA completions.

Given the evidence and growing trend to require FAFSA completion for high school seniors, the Arizona Mayors Education Roundtable resolves to:

- Raise awareness about the significance of FAFSA completion and discuss FAFSA data with councils and local education leaders;
- Promote the Arizona Promise Program, local promise initiatives, and statewide FAFSA completion resources (e.g., Ask Benji Chatbot, FAFSA Campaign, FAFSA Challenge, FAFSA Dashboard, and FAFSA Hotline):
- c. Establish FAFSA completion as an expectation for twelfth grade students, and support FAFSA completion events and workshops in their communities; and
- d. Explore approaches for incentivizing FAFSA completion and the potential of making FAFSA completion a high school graduation requirement in accordance with recommendations from the National College Attainment Network.
