Chairman Kross called the meeting to order and welcomed the attendees, including [Assistant] Chief [Mike] Farber to his first meeting as a representative of the Superstition Fire and Medical District and [Assistant] Chief Bob Badgett for Assistant Town Manager Marc Skocypec.

Chairman Kross noted the materials for this meeting are located on the [TRWC] website. This is because the packet of materials for this meeting is large and an effort is being made to move to a digital platform where possible to reduce the number of copies printed that may be discarded later.

Chairman Kross also provided instruction on the process for public comment, and reminded the participants the meeting is audio recorded.

2) Executive Session

Pursuant to ARS Sec 38-431.03, Discussion of Gila River Indian Community Interoperability Agreement.

John Pombier motioned to adjourn the TRWC Board of Director's Meeting and convene an Executive Session. Jerry Ward seconded. All were in favor; the motion passed.

Upon return from the Executive Session, Mark Openshaw motioned to open the TRWC Board of Director's Meeting and Jay Ducote seconded. All were in favor; the motion passed.

4) Discussion and Action on Board Meeting Minutes

September 29th, 2016 TRWC Board Meeting Minutes

Mark Openshaw motioned to approve the <u>09/29/16 TRWC Board Meeting Minutes</u> and Jay Ducote seconded. All were in favor; the motion passed.

5) <u>Discussion and Possible Action on Gila River Indian Community Interoperability Agreement</u>

Bill Anger noted that a couple of days ago, the Community asked for two changes to the Agreement. In both the Notice section and Signature Block area, the Police Department Chief has been substituted for the Fire Department Chief. Otherwise, the Agreement is identical to what the Board members have in the meeting materials.

John Pombier motioned to approve the Gila River Indian Community Interoperability Agreement and Mark Openshaw seconded. All were in favor; the motion passed.

Chairman Kross noted that Assistant Chief Bob Badgett needed to leave the Board Meeting early to attend an urgent meeting in Gilbert. Due to this, Chairman Kross asked to move up Item 7 on the agenda as it required Board action. Bill Anger confirmed Dale Shaw's question that there would not be any issues from a quorum standpoint if the representative from Gilbert left before the end of the meeting, if all the actions had been dealt with.

6) Discussion and Possible Action on Committee & Working Group Update

- a. Executive Committee Update Dale Shaw for Bob Badgett (Co-chair)
 - Governance Material Review Status

Dale Shaw explained the Executive Committee sub-team has been diligently working on the governance material resulting from efforts with the RWC, Bill Anger has reviewed the document, there are some pending revisions, and a lot of policy work remaining. A prevalent change is to call out independent policy and procedure documents rather than embed this language within governance. These independent policy and procedure documents can contain detail and allow flexibility for changes over time. As with current governance, the Board still has the responsibility to identify the policy framework. Once all draft policy and procedure documents are put together, the whole body of work will go back to the Executive Committee for endorsement. Upon that endorsement, the body of work will come before the Board sometime within the next calendar year.

Mr. Shaw responded to a question from Chairman Kross related to if the RWC is tracking on the same timeline as the TRWC to bring materials to their Board for review. Mr. Shaw explained the RWC and TRWC have not established formal timelines, both are continuing to work in the background at a good solid pace, will present the materials when they are ready, that while language between the two governance documents will be consistent as they originated from the same language, there will be differences, are not coordinating activities as it refers to changing individual governance material, but have agreed to keep each other informed.

- FY 17/18 Proposed Budget Preparation

Dale Shaw stated this item was sufficiently covered by Bob Badgett for Item 7.

- b. User Group Update Dale Crogan (Chairman)
 - VHF Project Update (Motorola attending as guest)

Dale Crogan explained the equipment from Motorola arrived yesterday and it has been verified, installation at the sites will begin as early as the beginning to mid-January [2017], and it is still on budget and schedule to hit the target date of July 1, 2017.

c. Governance Working Group - Dale Shaw

Dale Shaw explained they continue to be mindful of the original 2017 timeline. In January [2017] there will be a system administrator's meeting that he and Randy Thompson will attend. Various systems from the valley and state have been invited with the idea to work together on various areas of common interest one of which is the concept of a master agreement. The new master agreement will allow systems to be loosely coupled together under pseudo governance of a coordinating council where representation from each participating system includes a governing board and user representative. The idea is to work across the RWC, TRWC, and other systems as well. Mr. Shaw and David Felix of the RWC will be presenting the master agreement draft to attendees to solicit feedback and involvement in the process so there is a sense of ownership and a desire to sign on.

Mr. Shaw responded to a question from John Pombier regarding if user groups have been part of the process and are comfortable with the pace. Mr. Shaw explained there has been more activity than just the governance working group to address needs of the users and cited the VHF project as an example. Mr. Shaw explained it is the goal and has been demonstrated to have the user groups involved, to continue to have outreach, and allow this group to provide feedback. Additionally, the user group will be embedded in the process and have representation on the coordinating council. Further, Mr. Shaw explained the user groups have received various informal updates along the way.

7) <u>Discussion and Possible Action on FY 17/18 Proposed Budget</u> - Sherry McGlade & RandyThompson Sherry McGlade presented an overview of the FY 17/18 Proposed Budget as provided in the materials.

Dale Shaw clarified that VHF is allocated amongst the Fire partners in the TRWC that are utilizing that service and not among all Fire partners.

Sherry McGlade responded to a question from John Pombier how salaries are tied to the additional services to be provided by Motorola, and Dale Shaw noted the big departure from the previous budget is the inclusion of the Motorola contract to have additional services like security monitoring. Mr. Shaw noted that Randy Thompson was prepared to talk on that subject if the Board needed additional details. Chairman Kross stated that if there were not questions now, that further discussion and information sharing could take place at a future meeting.

Bob Badgett noted the budget has gone through the Executive Committee where it has been the focus for the last two months, the Motorola piece has been discussed and vetted through the Executive Committee. The recommendation was the budget be moved forward to this body with the recommendation to approve.

Chairman Kross appreciated everyone's involvement and noted it is very helpful for those presently involved in their respective organizations next fiscal year budget development process to have some certainty of a financial obligation. He also noted this is the earliest the TRWC budget has been considered for adoption.

Mike Farber motioned to approve the FY 17/18 Proposed Budget and Jay Ducote seconded. All were in favor; the motion passed.

8) <u>FirstNet Update</u> - Dave Faulkner

Dave Faulkner presented an overview of the provided material and introduced Karen Ziegler from the State of Arizona and Scott Neal with Mission Critical Partners who is a consultant with the state. Dave is working closely with these two people on all aspects. Karen Ziegler explained her role as the state project manager for the Arizona FirstNet project. Scott Neal provided information as to the timeline and delays due to a bid protest, and gave a high-level overview of events once the national partner is selected.

Mr. Neal explained he is working with Lt. Colonel Tim Chung from DPS to develop the process the draft plan will go through and identifying the appropriate people to be involved in reviewing technical, operational, policy, and legal implications, and provide feedback to FirstNet. Once the feedback from

this group is delivered to FirstNet, FirstNet will deliver a final plan through a portal to the Governor in which he has 90 days to decide if Arizona is going to opt in our out.

Mr. Faulkner explained that partners will have the choice to adopt FirstNet or stay with their carrier. Many officers and firefighters have mobile devices; however, FirstNet is not to replace land mobile radios, it is an extra tool in the toolbox for officers and firefighters to use in mobile phones, and air cards in computers, fire trucks, and police cars. FirstNet would be the broadband carrier for these devices.

Mr. Neal responded to a question from Chairman Kross related to a schedule for states in making the opt in or opt out decision and if the schedule was delayed due to the bid protest. Mr. Neal explained the timeline is unknown.

Mr. Neal responded to a question from Dale Shaw related to the opt in and opt out process, how the TRWC will be involved, and if it is still pending. Mr. Neal explained that he spoke with Lt. Col Chung yesterday about starting the process of identifying a diverse cross-section of individuals to review the plan.

Chairman Kross asked for a FirstNet update at the next Board meeting.

Mr. Neal explained that mission critical voice with FirstNet is down the road and that [Land Mobile Radio] LMR systems are going to be in place for the foreseeable future and to keep these systems maintained. Mr. Shaw further explained the data component of radio communications is in the foreseeable future and that we will continue to fund and operate our system for voice for some time.

9) <u>Discussion and Possible Action on Network Administrator Updates:</u>

- a. Budget & Finance Overview Sherry McGlade
 Sherry McGlade presented a financial update as provided in the materials.
- b. Network Updates & Performance Overview Randy Thompson

Randy Thompson provided a summary of the network updates and performance overview as provided in the materials. Additionally, he noted a follow-up to the FirstNet related to the point-to-point microwave radio that is being replaced as part of a capital project. Mr. Thompson explained the technology being employed is Ethernet or internet protocol based so when the time comes to transport anything, we are not behind on the technology and ready.

Mr. Thompson and Dale Shaw responded to a question from Chairman Kross regarding the Higher Ground application and if there is an opportunity to have a presence to express opposition at the FCC meeting. Mr. Thompson explained the meeting for the Commission to take action on the application has not been scheduled yet and with the amount of comments filed related to objection due to possible interference, the Commission could go ahead and grant but it would not be typical. Mr. Shaw explained the meeting is a public proceeding so we would have an option to participate and would just need to allocate resources to do this.

Subject: Salt River Pima-Maricopa Indian Community Membership Request

On May 8th, 2017, I received the attached formal request from the Salt River Pima-Maricopa Indian Community (SRPMIC) to begin the TRWC member admission process. Through initial work with SRPMIC, the TRWC Executive Committee, and staff, we have conceptualized the SRPMIC membership admission approach as follows:

- 1. In support of the pending dispatch agreement between SRPMIC and the City of Mesa, SRPMIC fire/medical calls will be dispatched in the same manner as all other calls dispatched on the "alarm" channel. The SRPMIC calls will be assigned a talkgroup on SRPMIC's existing network, which will be used for tactical operations for the call. The only TRWC network resources routinely utilized for SRPMIC fire/medical dispatch will be the initial dispatch of the fire and/or medical call on the fire "alarm" talkgroup. As is the case for any TRWC member, SRPMIC will be subject to normal billing for any non-dispatch use of the TRWC network.
- 2. SRPMIC will accept the current coverage and network performance as-is, with no other network improvements (outside of any planned capital projects) being required for ongoing participation in the TRWC.
- 3. We will likely recommend that no equity buy-in be required for SRPMIC admission. SRPMIC will therefore start with a \$0 equity balance which will be adjusted through any future capital project assessments.

While the discussions are ongoing, the above approach represents the general consensus at this stage. Should the TRWC Board find these conditions favorable, we anticipate the official recommendation to be forwarded in September 2017 with execution of the associated IGA amendment to be completed before the end of the calendar year (upon TRWC Board approval).

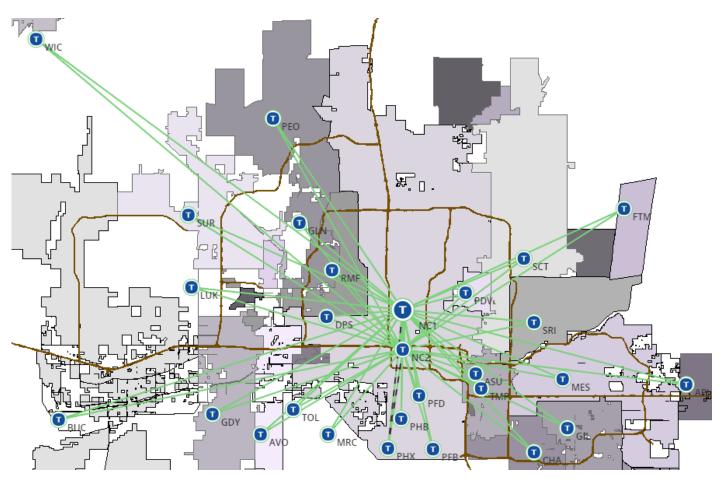

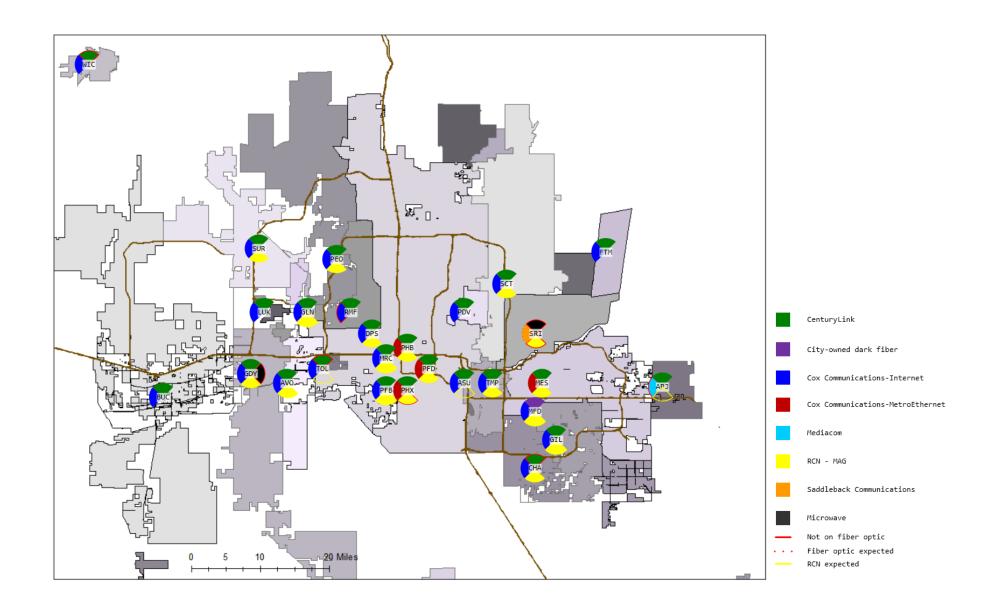

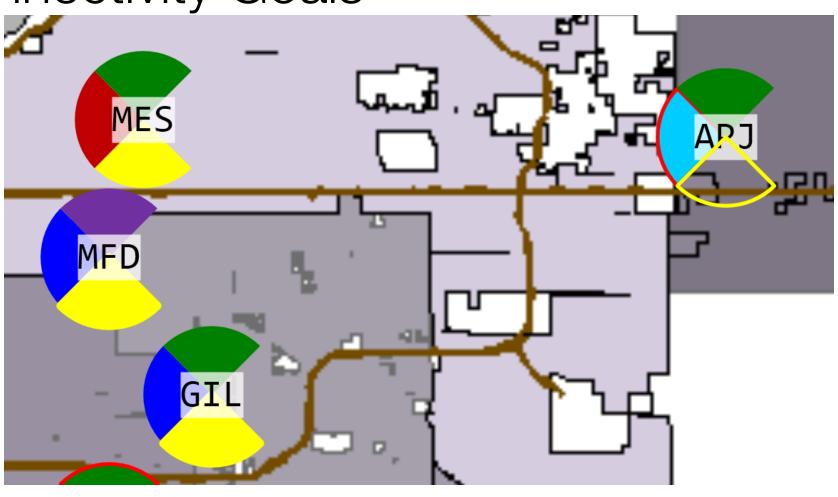

Capital Projects

- 1) Fire Hazard Zone Communication Infrastructure. This infrastructure will enable the Mesa Fire & Medical Regional Dispatch Alarm Room to communicate with the mobile and portable radios in Fire Hazard or Hot Zones, which will be operating on Very High Frequency (VHF, 150-174 MHz) radio frequencies in analog simplex mode. The funding for this project is included in the TRWC budget. The project milestones with status and dates are shown in the Appendix.
- 2) Point-to-Point Microwave Radio Wireless Backhaul Lifecycle upgrade. This lifecycle upgrade will replace the point-to-point microwave radios that connect the radio towers in the TOPAZ network together to transport data to and from the network core. The current equipment is no longer supported by the manufacturer, and uses older technology that does not support current transport protocols. This project is budgeted in the TRWC FY2017-2018 capital budget. The equipment will be arriving in July, 2017, with planned completion of the project by December, 2017.

Non-capital Projects

1) Florence Gardens TOPAZ site. Utilizing some of the equipment removed from Thompson Peak when that site was upgraded to create a 4-channel TOPAZ 800 MHz trunked site at the Florence Gardens site near Florence, AZ. This will enable the City of Mesa Gas Utility to communicate with resources in Mesa when they are providing service in the Magma Gas Service Area without manually switching their radios. This site will benefit TOPAZ members when traveling to the Pinal County Jail. This site went into service in mid-October.

The weakness in the point-to-point microwave radio network reported in the December 15, 2016, Administrator Update has been mitigated by reconfiguring the network connections to Florence Gardens. The site is now reliable, and not experiencing the brief outages reported previously.

2) **7.16 Upgrade**. The TOPAZ infrastructure software will be upgraded June 5-15, 2017. This upgrade is covered under the Motorola System Upgrade Assurance II contract, so there is no additional cost to the TRWC. Brief periods of "site trunking" will be encountered during the upgrade, and notices will be sent out by the upgrade project manager prior to the actual events.

Operations Summary

Unscheduled Impairments – Please see the unscheduled impairments chart on page 3. Since the last Administrator update on December 15, 2016, there were unscheduled impairments to the network, as follows:

- 1) On January 11, 2017, the Twin Knolls, FS262, and FS264 sites were out of service for just over 2-1/2 hours due to network problems.
- 2) On January 18, 2017, the Twin Knolls and FS262 sites were out of service for 5-1/2 minutes due to network problems.
- 3) On January 20, 2017, the Twin Knolls and FS262 sites were out of service for just over 5 minutes due to network problems.
- 4) Although it does not appear in the impairment chart as a reduction in availability due to no system alarms to bound the timeframe, on March 11, 2017, between 3-9 PM, Gilbert and Mesa Police Departments reported intermittent and geographically scattered (although generally in northern Gilbert and south central Mesa) radio coverage problems. As stated above, there were no alarms from the TOPAZ 800 MHz radio network, nor were there alarms from the transport network that connects the radio sites to the network core. Extensive investigation both the evening of March 11th and in subsequent days failed to find any hardware or software failures. The problem was remedied on March 11th by changing the physical radio channel used for the system control channel function. We have begun a monthly rotation of the physical radio channel used for the control channel function in an effort to avoid a repeat of this and the following event.
- 5) Similar to the event above, although it does not appear in the impairment chart as a reduction in availability due to no system alarms to bound the timeframe, on March 17-18, 2017, between 11:15 PM and 1:15 AM, the Mesa Police Department reported intermittent and geographically scattered (although generally in the western and central parts of Mesa) radio coverage problems. As stated above, there were no alarms from the TOPAZ 800 MHz radio network, nor were there alarms from the transport network that connects the radio sites to the network core. Extensive investigation both the evening of March 17-18 and in subsequent days failed to find any hardware or software failures. The problem was remedied on March 18th by changing the physical radio channel used for the system control channel function. We have begun a monthly rotation of the physical radio channel used for the control channel function in an effort to avoid a repeat of this and the following event.
- 6) You will note that 3 of the 5 incidents reported above were attributed to network problems. We have been working diligently with the network team to identify the causes and implement solutions to reduce the impairments attributable to network problems. Early indications are this effort is producing positive results, but we continue to monitor and implement improvements after they are identified and tested.

Airtime and Radio Counts – the following charts are included:

- 1) Six month rolling average airtime usage by member for fiscal year 2017 through April, 2017.
- 2) Average number of radios enabled by member for fiscal year 2017 through April, 2017.
- Six month rolling average airtime usage by service type for fiscal year 2017 through April, 2017.
- 4) Average number of radios enabled by service type for fiscal year 2017 through April, 2017.

Peak Channel Usage – the following charts are included:

1) Peak channel usage for each site for December, 2016, through April, 2107, is shown on the graphs at the end of this report. The following table is a summary of the number of days with an all channels in use event:

- a. Although all channels were in use on several occasions as shown above, no system busies have been reported by users.
- b. The sixth channel was brought on line at Shaw Butte on January 30, 2017. There have been no instances of all channels in use since this additional channel was added.

Upcoming Events:

- 1) Testing of TOPAZ 800 MHz radio network backup capability is planned for July, 2017.
- 2) The next City of Mesa Communications Building (quarterly) simulated power outage testing is planned for 5:00 AM on July 12, 2017.

Other News:

1) Potential Point-to-Point Microwave Radio Interference. Higher Ground LLC, a mobile satellite earth station startup business, applied to the Federal Communications Commission (FCC) for a nationwide license to operate mobile satellite earth station transmitters in the 6 GHz radio frequency band. Higher Ground's license application was granted on January 18, 2017. The 6 GHz radio frequency band is the same radio frequency band utilized by the TRWC and other Public Safety communications networks for point-to-point microwave radio service, which connects the TOPAZ radio sites to each other and together as a network. The Higher Ground system utilizes an attachment to a cellular telephone that would enable consumer-based text messaging, e-mail, and "Internet of Things" communications via geostationary satellites.

Higher Ground's application to the FCC requested (and Higher Ground was granted) waiver of two very important rules, as follows:

- a) Authorization of mobile operations in a Fixed Service radio frequency band; and
- b) Bypassing the required frequency coordination process

The concern is that bypassing these rules could result in interference to point-to-point microwave radio links which carry mission critical Public Safety communications.

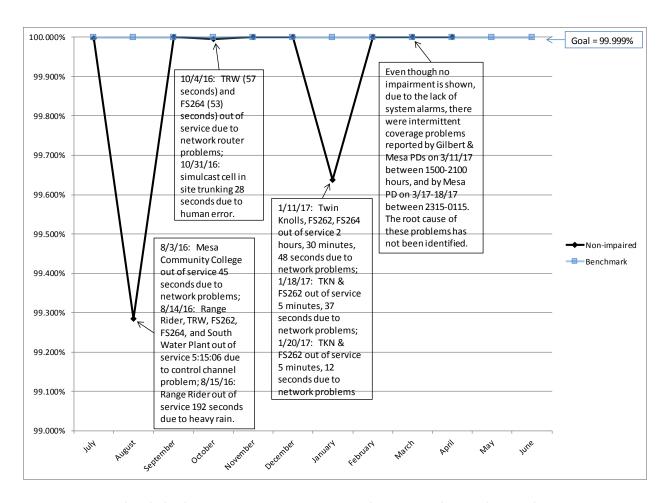

- 2) The amendment to the Motorola Solutions Upgrade Assurance II Agreement was approved by the Mesa City Council on May 8, 2017. These additional Motorola services were presented to the TRWC Board of Directors at their December 15, 2016, meeting as part of the FY2017-2018 budget presentation. This change in services was budgeted in the FY2017-2018 TRWC operations & maintenance budget.

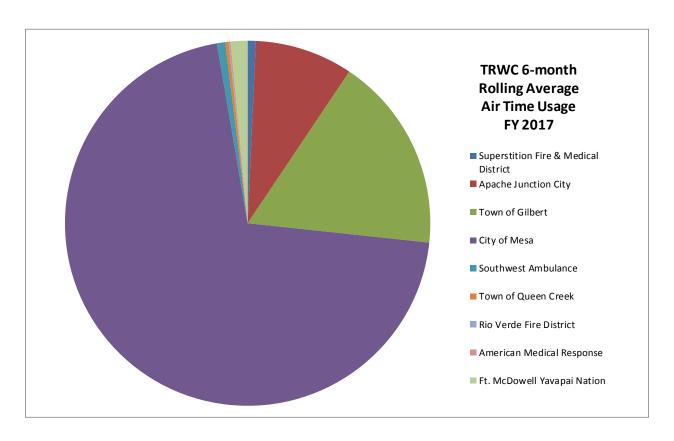

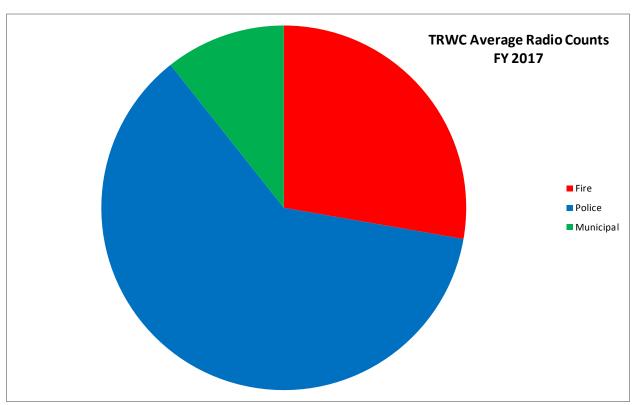


Unscheduled System Impairment, July, 2016 through April, 2017

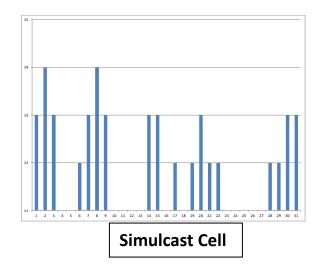


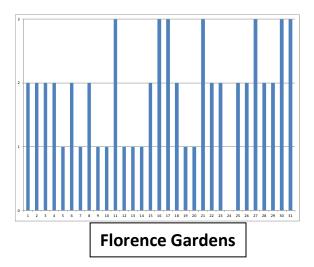


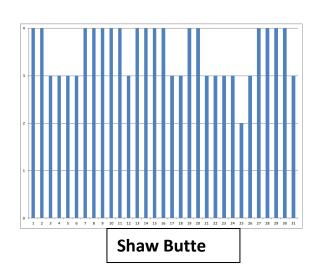


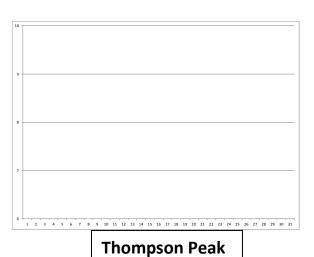


TOPAZ Peak Channel Usage, December, 2016

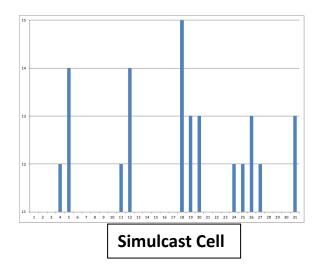


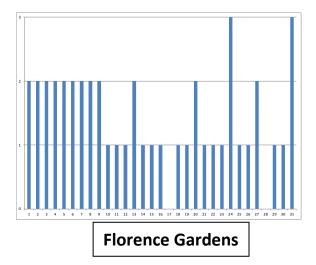


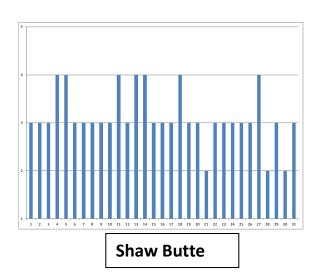


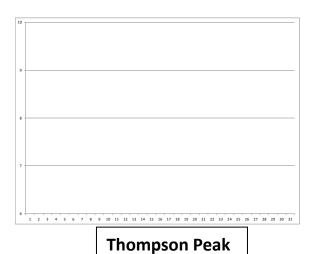


TOPAZ Peak Channel Usage, January, 2017

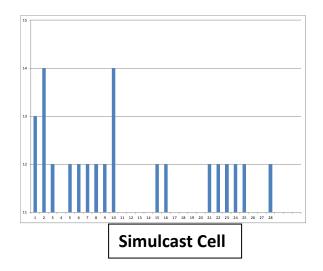


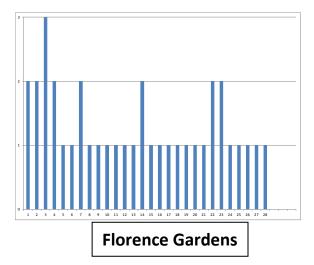


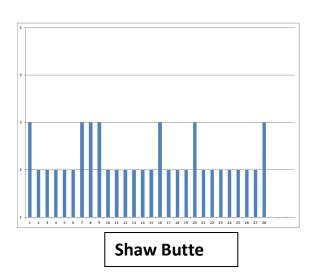


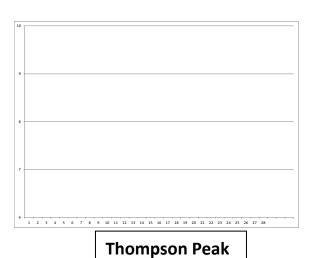


TOPAZ Peak Channel Usage, February, 2017

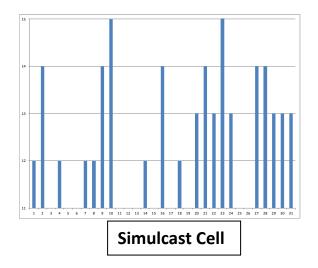


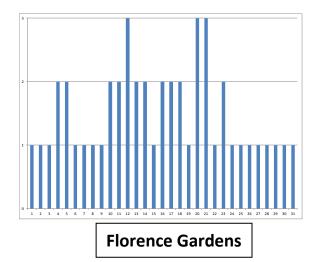


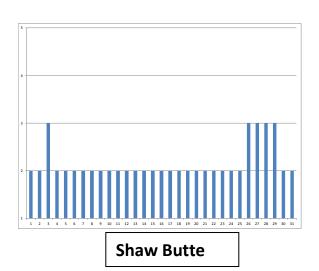


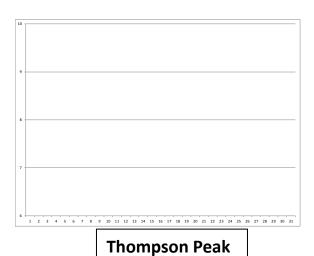


TOPAZ Peak Channel Usage, March, 2017
