Strategic Focus Area Project #1: Early Learning through High School

Priority area: Provide equitable access to quality early learning for Mesa families.

- Mesa K-Ready:
 - <u>Project lead</u>: MPS, with support from Mesa United Way and additional human service and philanthropic agencies.
 - Increasing # of parent advocates in program
 - Providing equitable access to early learning
 - Identifying at-risk, high need families to extend outreach
 - Connecting enrolled families to Kinder U/preschool openings
 - Providing parent support and school readiness for families



Mesa K-Ready is a FREE program which uses a combination of academic lessons, fun learning activities and family support to help Mesa parents and their 3 and 4-year-olds prepare for kindergarten.

- Increase post-second ary enrollment in Mesa by marketing the vareity of post-secondary opportunities.
- Help students/families seek both technical and financial assistance.
 - Mesa College Promise:
 - <u>Project lead</u>: Mesa Community College, with support from East Valley seconary educational institutions and the Mayor's office for support and fundraising.
 - Increasing access and participation:
 - Connecting to Dual Enrollment Opportunities
 - Marketing variety of post-secondary opportunities
 - Ensuring long-term sustainability of impact and program

2-years tuition and fees covered at MCC

Mesa College Promise is a commitment to Mesa residents that all eligible graduating Mesa high school students can attend Mesa Community College for two years with tuition and fees fully funded.

Financial support to those who have not received enough Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA) funds or other scholarships to completely cover the cost of college.

> FAFSA + Scholarships + Mesa College Promise = Fully Funded @ MCC







COMMUNITY COLLEGE

Who is Eligible?

- ✓ City of Mesa Resident
- ✓ High School Graduate- May 2022
 - From public, private, charter, GED program, or home school
 - 2.0+ cumulative high school GPA
- ✓ Demonstrate Financial Need
 - Based on FAFSA completion
- ✓ Enroll at Mesa Community College
 - Begin semester after high school/ Fall 2022
 - Full time 12 or more credit hours
 - Degree or certificate seeking student







COMMUNITY COLLEGE

Program Benefits

- ✓ Added College Funds
 - Financial support to help with tuition and fees for 2 years
- ✓ Assigned Academic Advisor
 - Advisor to provide academic and personal support
- ✓ Program Resources for Students
 - Access to tutoring, counseling, parking, transportation discounts, food pantry, etc.
 - Volunteer and internship opportunities in Mesa businesses
 - iPad loan program for 2 years
 - Workforce Development services and opportunities

Mesa College Promise #s

- **Original goal:** 250 students/year
- 60-70 currently enrolled participants
- May 15th Deadline: 325 approved applications for 21/22 grads

Strategic Focus Area Project #3: Workforce Development


Priority areas:

Identifying And Mitigating The Skills Gap In Hiring



There is an oversupply of qualified workers in jobs requiring high school diplomas and an undersupply at associate's and bachelor's degree attainment levels with a parity in supply and demand at advanced degree levels.
