He walked the Board through the pronunciation of the name, which was formed in partnership with local tribes. He then gave a short presentation on the upcoming THRIVE exhibit opening on January 24, 2025 (Exhibit A).

Hear a Presentation on idea Museum's new logos — Hannah Hockersmith, Marketing & Communications Specialist II, idea Museum:

Hannah Hockersmith gave a presentation on the new logo and updated branding for idea Museum and shared examples of how the brand will be used on various media including signage, advertisements, and employee apparel (**Exhibit B**).

Upcoming Events – Volunteer or Participation Opportunities:

Sarah Goedicke stated she would collect upcoming event opportunities from staff and send them to the Board. She also shared that Mesa Arts Center has three events coming up in March that could use volunteers: the 20th anniversary gala, an anniversary appreciation event, and the new ALT Festival.



A commitment of action – why the name change



- After listening to our First Nation neighbors, we worked closely with the Mayor on a 'Commitment of Actions".
- The previous name Mesa Grande, was a Spanish name given by early European settlers.
- Bi-monthly meetings with GRIC and SRPMIC to discuss museum business of interest
- Our commitment is to honor the sovereignty and heritage of our tribal community neighbors, such as -
 - Land Acknowledgement
 - General Plan historical narrative
 - New City Archaeologist position

The Process – listening, learning and collective action



- GRIC Elder Barnaby Lewis proposed the name Sce:dagi Mu:val Va'aki (Chuh-dag MOO-vahl VAH-Kee) and agreed by First Nations, and the City of Mesa
- Song stories about the Blue Fly on the Salt River
- Community members of SRPMIC and GRIC asked for ceremonies at the park




In preparation for the opening ceremony



- The new facility building signage indicates anew direction for the ancestral site.
- AZMNH was awarded \$200,000 from GRIC to continue consultation with the tribes to reinterpret the park. The name change is just the first step
- This will be part of our museum mastering.

Objectives



- 1. Introduce audiences to the idea of a cultural continuum between the first inhabitants of the Sonoran Desert, including the ancestral societies that built Sce:dagĭ Mu:val Va'aki and the extensive network of irrigation canals and that the modern Tribes are the generational continuum
- 2. Expand concepts about the deep-time human relationship such as the O'odham and Piipaash peoples and the Sonoran Desert.
- 3. Connect the AZMNH and Sce:dagĭ Mu:val Va'aki.
- 4. Serving as a safe platform to share traditional knowledge and tribal narratives.

Co-authorship




Our goal was to develop an exhibit respectfully working with SRPMIC and GRIC.

- 1. Consultations on content, archaeological artifacts and artworks
- Oral histories and 'lived experiences' with tribal members. When appropriate, we include text, sound, and/or video components of these conversations
- 3. Through these collaborations, the AZMNH ensures that the exhibit not only illuminates the peoples and culture but also gives the Tribes a platform to share their heritage in their own words.










Experience concept

- Visitors will be immersed in the deep time connection between the Sonoran Desert, the ancestral Sonoran Desert dwellers, and O'odham communities.





Exhibit layout






























