The Mesa Parks and Recreation Advisory Board held a meeting open to the public at the date and time above.

1. CALL TO ORDER

Chair Campbell called the meeting to order at 5:01 PM.

2. ROLL CALL

3. APPROVAL OF THE MINUTES

It was moved by Member Rush and seconded by Member Narish to approve the regular meeting minutes from January 8, 2025. The motion passed unanimously.

4. PUBLIC COMMENTS

Chair Campbell reported that Jan Holdeman submitted a comment card to address the board about Acacia Retention Basin.

Holderman stated that the Acacia Retention Basin in his area has been taking a lot of abuse from people riding motorized vehicles. He stated that public education is not working and that the only thing that would be effective is barriers.

Chair Campbell thanked Holderman for sharing his concerns with the board.

5. TAKE ACTION ON RENAMING MONTEREY PARK TO CHRISTOPHER J. BRADY PARK Parks Board consideration of the staff recommendation to rename Monterey Park at 7045 E. Monterey Ave. to Christopher J. Brady Park.

Chair Campbell stated that Mr. Brady has been the City Manager here at the City of Mesa since 2006. He visits Monterey Park often and it would be special to recognize his time with Mesa as he gets ready to retire.

Director Moore stated that the naming policy process is to bring requests to the board to have a discussion and vote on it. If the board approves the request, the approved minutes from the meeting will be presented to Council for acceptance. At that point the new park name is established.

Chair Campbell stated that he thought that Mr. Brady has done a good job serving the City and had been very involved with Parks.

Member Rush inquired about the possibility of previous Mayor Giles having a park named after him as well. Director Moore stated that it is a possibility to consider. She continued by stating Mr. Brady has overseen major improvements to the Parks system and has led passage of three bond programs. Member Rush inquired if there was a list of criteria to help determine consideration. Director Moore stated that the policy talks about some considerations for naming a park after an organization or individual. Some examples would be if property is being donated, if a significant about of money was donated for development or a person of interest was accepted as a local or national hero within the community.

There was discussion as to why this park was considered and Director Moore stated that it was largely due to Mr. Brady's vision that this park became more of a destination park with all the amenities and the first express library. She also commented that he runs through the park every morning.

There was discussion of the possibility of looking into renaming or naming parks after other impactful people within the community such as John Giles.

After further discussion it was moved by Board Member Rush; seconded by Vice-Chair Maldonado to approve the renaming of Monterey Park to Christopher J. Brady Park. The motion passed unanimously.

6. MARKETING PROGRAM PRESENTATION – Haylie Smith- Support Services Administrator; Dewey Jefferies- Marketing Coordinator; Bianca Barajas- Marketing and Communications Specialist II (see attached presentation)

Haylie Smith started by explaining the roles within the Admin Support Team and more specifically the Marketing Team which includes the Marketing Coordinator, Dewey Jefferies, two Marketing and Communication Specialist II's, Bianca Barajas and Antonia Mejia, and 1 intern, Michael Wolman. They are tasked with communication of our services to the public. The team does an extensive amount of training with staff on how to follow the department's communication guidelines.

Bianca Barajas stated that she creates all the newsletters, looks over graphic design work and handles all the social media for PRCF. The interactive newsletter has over 74,000 subscribers who receive it monthly with 138 new subscribers in 2024. Social media audiences have been increasingly growing since January 1 due in part to new strategies put in place and a new content calendar. Posts going out are more interactive with more videos and collaboration with other entities.

Dewey Jefferies started by saying that he handles all marketing that involves technology including drones, video recordings and the website. We launched a new website in November which included a redesign and consolidation. The website has just under 175,000 visits so far in 2025.

Jefferies continued by sharing that The Jump in Catalog has been renamed and made into a magazine called "The Playbook" which is fully available online with hyperlinks. It is more engaging and simpler to read. The Playbook has already been viewed by 5,146 people.

Member Goldsby commented that there are still many people who are not aware of the services available through Parks and Rec. Haylie Smith stated that we are working on increasing outreach. She continued saying that staff are available to talk to small groups to educate them about our offerings. Looking into the future, we are working on updating sponsorship packets to try and educate different businesses within the community on what they can sponsor. We are also looking at better ways to reach our Spanish speaking population. Finally, we are looking at ways to integrate Commercial Facilities getting more information out to the public about their services as well.

Chair Campbell asked staff to look into outreach at opening days for Little League.

7. DIVISION UPDATES – Recreation, Commercial, Planning & Operations (see attached presentation)

RECREATION-Alison Walker-Senior Fiscal Analyst- filled in for Aimee Manis Deputy Director. Participation numbers were shared for aquatics, adaptive, park rangers, athletics, recreation centers, and youth programs.

COMMERCIAL: Roger Singleton – Deputy Director, Commercial Operations, presented information to summarize events and attendance at the Convention Center, Amphitheater, The Post, Dobson Ranch Golf Course, and the Mesa Cemetery.

PARK PLANNING & OPERTIONS – Brandon Erno – Deputy Director, Planning and Operations, presented updates on projects in progress at Carriage Lane Park, Pioneer Park, and turf to granite conversions.

Design is underway on ADA Updates at Quail Run Park, Airpine Park Playground Improvements, Countryside Dog Park Expansion, The Courts at Eastmark construction, Reed Park Playground Improvements, Signal Butte Park Phase II construction, and Whitman Park Playground Improvements.

Deputy Director Erno stated that Basin 306 is the basin that Jan Holdeman has concerns about and it is undergoing maintenance and repair. It is being fenced off and slopes are being reshaped to bring the landscaping up to standards. The project will take about 6 weeks to complete.



Member Rush inquired about the status of Mountain Vista Trail repairs. Deputy Director Erno stated that the project is still ongoing with the contractor making the repairs to meet specs but that it is almost complete.

8. DIRECTOR'S UPDATES Andrea Moore – Director

- Summer Registration begins April 7th for Residents and April 14th for Non-Residents.
- Celebrate Mesa Saturday, April 12, 2025, at Pioneer Park from 10:00-2:00.
- The Convention Center Strategic Plan is being presented to Council on March 20th.
- April 3rd will be the budget presentation to Council, with budget cuts happening due to the loss of Rental Tax Income and the Flat Income Tax totaling about \$20 million a year less to Mesa. Every department with general fund money is going through reductions. This will impact some programs, but the list of cuts is still being discussed. We will be asking the board to look at a second round of Fees and Charges changes to go into effect in the fall. The previous round is going into effect on April 1. The new changes will only include fees within approved ranges with about a 9% increase across the board. The operating budget for Parks will be reduced by about \$800,000.

Member Goldsby shared an idea of how to generate more money by adding night or evening swims at the pools. Director Moore stated that the pools are the most upside-down in cost recovery and they will more than likely be pulling back some aquatic programs. Director Moore stated that she is always open to the Board reaching out to her with any ideas.
